

Violence Intervention & Prevention (VIP) Funding

Historical look at VIP Funding

Since 2021, PCCD has supported more than 240 local projects & initiatives, ranging from smaller grassroots programs to large-scale, community-wide and regional partnerships.

\$190M in VIP Grant funding awarded to date






Collaborative Community Violence Intervention (CCVI) Grants

In 2022, PCCD created a new pilot program designed to support comprehensive, coordinated violence intervention strategies in focused geographic areas.

A total of six CCVI projects have been awarded in five counties to date:

- Allegheny County
- Delaware County
- Lehigh County
- Philadelphia County
- York County

Comparing Open VIP Funding Announcements

VIP Grants

- Intervention and Response Focused (addresses violence that is already happening in communities)
- Suitable for standalone programs run by an organization and/or its partners
- Supports both new and existing programs + orgs
- Wide variety of eligible models + strategies
- Targets "elevated risk" places + populations

BOOST Grants

- Prevention Focused (Youth)
- Supports wide range of out-of-school time programming + models that go beyond traditional antiviolence strategies
- Includes youth-focused activities like mentoring and career readiness
- Targets "at-risk" school-age populations, especially in un- and underserved communities

Collaborative CVI Strategies

- Comprehensive, Systems-Focused Community Violence Intervention (CVI) Strategies
- Enhance local coordination to address gun and group violence across an entire community.
- Best suited for projects involving multiple system partners + orgs working together in the same area.
- Aids in local planning and execution of targeted violence prevention strategies.
- Targets "elevated risk" places + populations

FY 2024-25 VIP Grant Solicitations

\$45 million in state funding for VIP has been directed to PCCD for providing grants and technical assistance to address community violence throughout Pennsylvania through two solicitations:

Review of Funding Announcement

Collaborative Community Violence Intervention (CCVI) Strategies Grant Funding

Defining "CVI"

CVI is an approach that uses evidence-based, community-centered strategies to reduce violence.



Community-centered

- Informed by and tailored to community residents + stakeholders
- Prioritize the needs of the community
- Engage social service partners to collaborate with residents + law enforcement partners.
- Focus on reducing violence + building community together.



Equitable + inclusive

- Care must be taken to guarantee community members most affected + most disenfranchised are included in:
 - Creating CVI solutions AND
 - Benefitting from them.



Evidence-informed

- CVI strategies should be based on evidence from multiple disciplines + methods.
- Evidence = research, evaluations, case studies, expert opinions, field lessons, etc.
- Ideally, CVI programs engage in research + evaluation to strengthen the evidence base for what works.



Effective + sustainable

- CVI programs must show measurable impacts on violence + community wellbeing.
- Programs need access to resources to address new and ongoing challenges over time.

Defining "Collaborative"

Establishing and consistently adhering to a shared set of commitments and principles that allows for effective and efficient service to communities.

- ✓ Convening partners regularly.
- ✓ Continuously assessing progress towards project goals.
- ✓ Identifying potential barriers/unintended consequences
- ✓ Developing system(s) of referral.
- ✓ Identifying gaps in services/supports.
- ✓ Assessing quality of services/supports.
- ✓ Identifying opportunities for increased effectiveness and efficiency.
- ✓ Ensuring participants receive high-quality care, services.
- ✓ Improving coordination and linkages among to other services.
- ✓ Improving access to services, resources, and support for victims of gun violence.





CCVI Grants

Under this CCVI grants solicitation, applicants may seek funding through one of two tracks.

- Track 1: CCVI Planning Grants

 <u>Goal</u>: Provide funding for local jurisdictions (counties, municipalities) to support the development of violence reduction plans.
- Track 2: CCVI Implementation Grants

 <u>Goal</u>: Advance collaborative, community-driven strategies to reduce violence using proven methods within counties/municipalities with the highest levels of gun incidents and injury statewide, especially those who experienced an increase in homicides between 2022 and 2023.





Things to Consider: CCVI Grant Requirements



Violence Reduction Council (or similar entity) established or formed to support local planning and/or implementation efforts.



Local Violence Reduction
Plan already completed
(CCVI Implementation
Grants) or developed

Funding Match
(Implementation Projects
ONLY) – All CCVI

Overview of CCVI 'Tracks'

Track 1: Planning Grants

- Covers costs for strategic planning, including staff, consultants, data collection, research, travel, and training.
- Organizations receiving a CCVI Planning Grant that form a Violence Reduction Council and complete a local violence reduction plan will be prioritized for future VIP funding to implement strategies that address identified gaps + needs.

Track 2: Implementation Grants

- Fund activities addressing local drivers of violence + needs identified in a recently completed local violence reduction plan, created with a Violence Reduction Council or similar group.
- Projects must align with the plan and be overseen by the Council.
- A match of 10% in Year 2 and 25% in Year 3 is required.
- Note: PCCD expects to fund 2-3 projects.
 Those not meeting requirements should consider CCVI Planning (Track 1) or VIP Grants.



Under both CCVI Tracks, priority consideration will be given to initiatives that would take place in ZIP code(s) with the highest levels of firearm-related injury and/or counties that experienced an increase in homicides between 2022 and 2023.

Important Dates

- October 30, 2024 Final date to submit questions regarding this announcement.
- October 31, 2024 Deadline to submit application in Egrants.
- January 2025 Applications presented to the School Safety and Security Committee for initial approval.
- January/Feb. 2025 Recommended applicants for award work with PCCD staff to finalize their award.
- March 1, 2025 Project start date.

Reminder: CCVI Implementation Grants (Track 2) require a funding match.



Eligible Applicants

- Community-based organizations (i.e., active, registered 501(c)(3)s)
- Institutions of higher education
- Municipalities
- Counties
- *District Attorney's Offices



*Counties must submit applications in PCCD's Egrants system on behalf of district attorney's offices.



Indirect Cost Limit

Indirect costs are limited to 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC). It will be reduced if this is exceeded.

What direct costs are included under this calculation?



- Salaries & wagesFringe benefits
- Materials & supplies
- Services
- Travel
- Up to the first \$25,000 of each subaward



- Equipment
- Capital expenditures
- Charges for rent
- **Tuition remission**
- Portion of each subaward in excess of \$25,000

Navigating the Application Process



Multi-Phased Process

Phase 1: Application (Egrants)

Phase 2: Application Review and Scoring

Phase 3: School Safety and Security Committee Approval

Phase 4: Project Implementation



Application Steps

STEP 1: Review questions in the <u>CCVI Funding Announcement</u>.

STEP 2: Compile letters of support or other mechanisms demonstrating commitment of named partners to the proposed project.

STEP 3: Submit application in Egrants (including required attachments).

STEP 4: Subject to availability and authorization of funds, organizations/entities recommended and approved for FY 2024-25 CVI Grants funding will be notified in January 2025.

STEP 5: Approved grantees will be contacted by PCCD staff to address any program or fiscal concerns to finalize the award process.



Egrants application must be submitted no later than Thursday October 31, 2024.



Application Process

- Eligible applicants must submit applications using <u>PCCD's Egrants</u> <u>System</u>.
- Final recommendation of projects will be made following the receipt and review of applications in Egrants.







Getting Started in Egrants

- Step 1: Create an Egrants account (see <u>Getting</u> <u>Started in Egrants</u> webpage + the <u>PCCD Egrants</u> <u>Keystone Login Guide</u>).
- Step 2: Register your organization with Egrants.
- Step 3: Request roles in Egrants (see <u>Appendix</u>
 <u>A</u>) to make sure you have the right users and permissions set up.



User Manager

- Every agency should have an Agency User Manager security role.
- The User Manager approves role requests and maintains existing security for users already established within their agency.
- PCCD Home Page → Egrants icon User Manager Help Guide





User Roles

Access to the Agency's grants are separated into six unique roles:

- Financial Creator can view and create fiscal information (manage budget section information, fiscal reports, etc.)
- Financial Reader can view fiscal information
- Program Creator can view and create program information (manage program section information, program reports, etc.)
- Program Reader can view program information
- Submission can submit grant forms like applications, modification, and continuations
- User Manager can manage user roles for the Agency's grants (will still need other roles if performing other duties)




User Registration Tip



Every agency must register <u>two users</u> in order to complete their grant application.

- ✓ Statement of Problem & Current Efforts (10 points)
- ✓ Project Description (40 points)
- ✓ Community Engagement & Equity (15 points)
- ✓ Required Attachments



NOTE: Applicants are strongly encouraged to carefully read and review the written funding announcement document <u>prior</u> to starting their Egrants application.



E-Signature


The PA Peace Alliance is a one-stop-shop for free technical assistance, training, and other resources.


