

Violence Intervention & Prevention (VIP) Grant Funding

Historical look at VIP Funding

Since 2021, PCCD has supported more than 240 local projects & initiatives, ranging from smaller grassroots programs to large-scale, community-wide and regional partnerships.

\$190M in VIP Grant funding awarded to date





VIP Grants have supported a wide range of programs designed to address root causes + impacts of community violence.

Comparing Open VIP Funding Announcements

VIP Grants

- Intervention and Response Focused (addresses violence that is already happening in communities)
- Suitable for standalone programs run by an organization and/or its partners
- Supports both new and existing programs + orgs
- Wide variety of eligible models + strategies
- Targets "elevated risk" places + populations

BOOST Grants

- Prevention Focused (Youth)
- Supports wide range of out-of-school time programming + models that go beyond traditional antiviolence strategies
- Includes youth-focused activities like mentoring and career readiness
- Targets "at-risk" school-age populations, especially in un- and underserved communities

Collaborative CVI Strategies

- Comprehensive, Systems-Focused Community Violence Intervention (CVI) Strategies
- Enhance local coordination to address gun and group violence across an entire community.
- Best suited for projects involving multiple system partners + orgs working together in the same area.
- Aids in local planning and execution of targeted violence prevention strategies.
- Targets "elevated risk" places + populations

FY 2024-25 VIP Grant Solicitation

\$45 million in state funding

for VIP has been directed to PCCD for providing grants and technical assistance to address community violence throughout Pennsylvania through two solicitations.

Review of Funding Announcement

2024-25 Violence Intervention & Prevention (VIP) Grant Funding

In Focus: Solicitation 1, VIP Grants

Under this VIP grants solicitation, applicants may seek funding through one of two tracks.

- VIP Track 1: Expansion/Enhancement Grants for Established* Programs <u>Goal</u>: Support the continuation, expansion, and enhancement of effective, community led strategies to intervene and respond to community violence. *"Established programs" = 2 years or longer
- VIP Track 2: Start-Up Grants
 Goal: Provide financial, technical assistance, training, coaching, and other supports to grassroots community organizations to support new* programming as well as strengthen their infrastructure, enhance sustainability, and meet essential capacity needs.
 - * "New programming" = less than 2 years



Applicants may only submit one application under this funding announcement.



Important Dates

- October 30, 2024 Final date to submit questions regarding this announcement.
- October 31, 2024 Deadline to submit Initial Funding Request in SurveyMonkey.
- Jan. 2025 Applications presented to the School Safety and Security Committee for approval.
- January/Feb. 2025 Applicants recommended for an award will work with PCCD staff to finalize their award.
- March 1, 2025 Project start date.

Eligible Applicants

- Community-based nonprofit organizations with 501(c)(3) status
- Institutions of higher education
- Municipalities
- Counties
- *District attorney's offices



If a DA's Office is successful in its initial funding request, the county must apply in Egrants on their behalf to finalize an award.



Priority Considerations

VIP Track 1: Expansion/Enhancement Grants for Established Programs

- Serve individuals with highest risk for gun violence involvement through evidencebased CVI strategies.
- Support projects co-implemented with multiple partners.
- Support continuation of successful projects whose current VIP Grant awards have ended, or are ending, as of June 30, 2025.

VIP Track 2: Start-Up Grants

 Grassroots, community-based organizations that have not previously received a state grant (including from PCCD).



Under both VIP Tracks, priority consideration will be given to initiatives that would take place in ZIP code(s) with the highest levels of firearm-related injury and/or counties that experienced an increase in homicides between 2022 and 2023.



How Much Money Can We Apply For?

- Under this funding solicitation, maximum award amounts will be based on an applicant's current annual actual operating expenditures (not actual or budgeted revenue or budgeted expenditures).
- Applicants may not request more than 50% of their total actual operating expenditures for the period of July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024, or the maximum allowable amount for each VIP Track, whichever is less.



Examples of documentation that would be sufficient to verify the grant amount requested include:

- Statement of Activity, Profit/Loss Statement, or similar report form the applicant's accounting system
- Form 990
- Audited Financial Statement



Eligible Activities and Expenses

- 1. Increasing access to quality trauma-informed support services and behavioral health care.
- 2. Providing health services and intervention strategies by coordinating the services provided by eligible applicants and coordinated care organizations.
- 3. Providing mentoring and other intervention models to children and their families who have experienced trauma or are at risk of experiencing trauma.
- 4. Fostering and promoting communication between the school entity, community, and law enforcement.
- 5. Any other program or model designed to reduce community violence and approved by the committee.



Applicants will be asked to identify the category that is most applicable to the project they are proposing.



Examples of Eligible VIP Program Approaches

Street outreach and violence interruption programs using credible messengers

Group-related violence interventions (e.g., GVI)

Tailored case management for people at high risk of violence (e.g., education, employment, housing, health)

Hospital-based violence intervention programs (HVIPs)

Safe routes and transportation initiatives in gun violence-affected neighborhoods

Strengthening pre-release and reentry programs for those involved in firearm-related offenses

Trauma-informed support for victims/survivors of gun violence

**Programs preventing domestic violence and firearmrelated injuries **Establishing or enhancing
Violence Reduction Councils
(VRCs) to focus on gun violence
prevention strategies

Track-Specific Eligible Grant Activities

Track (Expansion/Enhancement)

- Continued service (serving additional participants) for established programs that have been in place for at least 2 years
- Additional services, resources, and supports
- Project-specific TA for program or model implementation
- Costs associated with grants management

Track 2 (Start-up)

- Activities designed to increase the organization's capacity to employ CVI strategies
- Implementation costs to begin new violence intervention/response strategy or support costs associated with a < 2 year program
- Professional development and training for staff and volunteers
- Other eligible expenses to support grantrelated activities



Technical assistance will be available for all VIP grantees. Track 2 applicants will be required to participate in technical assistance and coaching supports provided by VIP Technical Assistance providers.



Eligible & Ineligible Activities and Expenses



- Salaries and benefits for personnel (full- or part-time), including overtime
- Contractors/consultants
- Supplies and equipment
- Training and technical assistance
- Travel/transportation expenses
- Other activities and expenses necessary to meet the needs of programs and participants



- Construction
- Land acquisition
- Lobbying and political contributions
- Honoraria or bonuses
- Vehicle purchases
- Any expenses that fall significantly outside of the scope of the funding announcement



Indirect Cost Limit

Indirect costs are limited to 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC). It will be reduced if this is exceeded.

What direct costs are included under this calculation?



- Salaries & wagesFringe benefits
- Materials & supplies
- Services

- Up to the first \$25,000 of each subaward



- Equipment
- Capital expenditures
- Charges for rent



Application Steps & Timeline

STEP 1: Review questions and prepare responses within the Proposal Narrative Template, including the relevant budget information.

STEP 2: Compile letters of support or other mechanisms demonstrating commitment of named partners to the proposed project.

STEP 3: Complete Survey Monkey Initial Request Form; when prompted upload proposal narrative, Letters of Support, etc.

STEP 4: Subject to availability and authorization of funds, organizations/entities recommended and approved for FY 2024-25 VIP Grants funding will be notified in January 2025.

STEP 5: Approved grantees will be asked to complete an application in Egrants to continue the process toward receiving funding.





The online SurveyMonkey initial request form and required attachments must be submitted to PCCD no later than Thursday, October 31, 2024.



Frequently-Asked Questions

- Can we apply for VIP, CCVI and BOOST?
- I am a school; can I apply for VIP funding?
- We have had a VIP grant in the past. Are we eligible to apply to this round of funding?
- If I currently have an active VIP grant, does that impact my ability to be awarded again?
- Can we get feedback on previous applications?
- Is this funding focused solely on gun violence?

- What types of training and supports are provided to applicants and grantees?
- If a project proposal is for less than the 3-year period, does that impact the maximum amount I can request?
